

Round-table explores 'age-friendly' housing

options for Bay seniors

How do we make St Margaret's Bay an agefriendly community?

What needs to be done to help people stay in their communities as they age?

These are just a couple of the issues the Seniors Association tackled at a round-table discussion on housing needs for the area.

The association is working closely with the Stewardship Association to help shape the economic and social development of the Bay.

Fifty people attended the round-table at Shining Waters Marina.

The contributions from those who took part will be used to guide the association's housing committee on development of a housing strategy for the future.

The discussion was opened by Carol Evans.

Pre-prepared questions initiated a series of



conversations about types of housing, location, cost and resources.

Seniors Association director René Lavoie, a member of the housing committee, says the round table was an effective way to engage people on an important issue.

"A potentially precious resource is the knowledge and experience of those who have recently assisted their own parents through their last few years.

"Access to this knowledge would be most useful. It could be used to identify the positive as well the limiting factors associated with aging and living our last years in the Bay context, and to design a pleasant Seniors complex where people could age in

place among friends and in the proximity of the support services they need."

The Seniors Association envisions a multi-generational development which would include modestly-priced, efficient and environmentally-friendly housing of varying designs.

# Act now to seek snow removal assistance

If you are a senior and you want help with snow removal, you'd better act quickly.

The <u>HRM snow removal</u> <u>program</u> is available to seniors 65 years of age or older and persons with disabilities in the Halifax Regional Municipality.

The program offers assistance to clear snow from steps, walkways, and access to fuel tanks.

To qualify you need to live in a single dwelling home that you own or rent, and total gross household income of all people living on the premises must be less than \$30,000.

# Play your part in connecting Bay area communities


CC-Net is not three months old yet - but it's already making a valuable contribution to life around St Margaret's Bay.

## Human touch is key to successful weather forecasting

Peter Coade (above) entertained a well attended meeting with stories from his path to becoming the Maritimes' most-experienced meteorologist.

Peter is best known now for his early morning weather reports on CBC radio. But there's much more to his day than that. He makes detailed forecasts for three areas of New Brunswick, PEI, and five areas of Nova Scotia - as well as providing aviation and marine forecasts for the area. Peter worked for CBC, CFRB

in Toronto, and ATV before returning to the CBC in 2007.

Why do we sometimes get different forecasts from different sources? Peter talked about the advantage of having half a century of experience to apply to his work, compared to some other forecasts which are generated by computers. Right on cue, a rainbow appeared over his right shoulder as he spoke.
