## Village Self-Help Groups: new idea from Bay Seniors


#### Our Members' Summer - in pictures and words


# Teen gives everyone 'a reason to feel inspired'

In the spring of 2020, early in the days when COVID had us sheltering at home, a 17-year-old high school student, Angus Whyte (right), reached out to Bay Seniors, suggesting he and his brother would be interested in volunteering to help some seniors with yard work.

The offer was accepted gratefully, and the boys provided help where it was needed.

Several months later, with winter looming, Angus reached back out to Bay Seniors with this email:

"I've been loving the opportunity to help out some seniors in my area this summer! I know that there's a lot of demand for volunteers and I'm sure that demand only increases when people need to start shovelling driveways. With this in mind, I would love to be able to put together a teenage volunteer group at my school in association with the Bay Seniors organization. I haven't figured out any specifics yet, but I was wondering if this is something you'd be receptive to? I know there is some interest among students, and I think this is a



perfect opportunity for them to get involved in the community."

The happy result of Angus' initiative was Students for Seniors, a group to help with snow-shovelling and woodpiling – and later computer tablet training – for seniors in our community.

In March this year, we invited Angus to attend a virtual town hall with Federal Ministers Bernadette Jordan and Deb Schulte, to talk about the value of intergenerational partnerships and projects. Of course, he did a wonderful job, and the Ministers understood why we like to call Angus "Canada's Future Prime Minister."

Bay Seniors board member, Keith Innis, who has worked closely with Angus on Students for Seniors projects, says, "Angus is a special kind of person, always there to help when he can. The many hours he gave getting his volunteers together and then organizing the tasks seniors needed done goes beyond deserving a thank you.

"But we really want to share a big Thank You from all of us who have had the opportunity to meet and work with him, and we wish him all the best in his future endeavours."

The world is opening back up post COVID. And Angus is heading off to university, a recipient of the Bishop's University Chancellor's Excellence Scholarship.

We'll miss him. But we sure won't forget him: during those 15 months of COVID challenges, when we all looked for reasons to feel inspired, we didn't have to look farther than Angus Whyte.

# A month of art around the Bay
