More than 35 businesses, crafters, and community organizations are getting ready to greet visitors at Bay Expo 2022 on Saturday, May 28 from 11 to 3 at Estabrooks Community Hall in Lewis Lake.

Many exhibitors will also have products for sale.

Meanwhile, community members have been generously donating treasures for the flea market – with proceeds to Bay Seniors – and to the jewellery table – with proceeds to the SMB Food Bank.

Bay Seniors will be there with sewn items, including tote bags and placemats.

There will also be a silent auction, refreshments, and children's activities.

Many people, especially seniors, are cautious about



attending events right now, so the planning committee is designing the layout to provide as much social distancing as possible.

All exhibitors and volunteers will wear masks, and visitors are strongly encouraged to do so.

There will be a café area for eating and drinking, and all children's activities can be enjoyed while wearing a mask.

There will be no face-painting this year, but a volunteer will be making balloon animals.

The Peggy's Cove Area Festival of the Arts is holding its Artful Birdhouses event on Saturday, May 14 at the Community Enterprise Centre from 1.30 to 3.30.

Birdhouses created and donated by local artists will be sold this year in a silent auction, with all proceeds going to the St. Margaret's Bay Food Bank.

Viewing opens at 1.30, with bidding from 2 pm to 3 pm. Bidding closes at 3 sharp.

Successful bidders will be notified on site, and payments accepted immediately after that.

This will be an indoor-outdoor event, with viewing and bidding taking place in small groups to support social distancing.

Everyone will have a second opportunity to bid.

Masks must be worn inside the CFC and on the deck.

Grant helps seniors stay in own homes

Don't miss the chance to apply for a 2022 Senior Care Grant.

You may be eligible for a grant of \$500 to help offset what you pay for services that help you remain in your own home.

You may qualify if you:

- •Were 65 or older in 2021
- Have a net household income of \$37,500 or less
- Live independently in your own home (not with a caregiver other than spouse/ partner)
- •Own your own home (your name is on the deed)

Eligible services include meal preparation, grocery and medication delivery, housecleaning, laundry, outdoor maintenance (lawn, garden, driveway, snow removal), small home repairs and painting, and transportation (shuttles, taxis) to essential services.

The deadline to apply is May 31. The application must be completed online and can be found at https://

Reader Round-up: 'Things mom said.'

In honour of Mother's Day, we asked you to share things your mother (grandmother, aunt, or mother figure) said that have stayed with you. Here's what some of our members had to say.

Elaine Brooks:

My grandmother was a woman of few words, but when she spoke, everyone listened.

She was mindful of how things could change and would say "I ganu cyn brecwast mae i wehyddu cyn swper," which is Welsh for "To sing before breakfast is to weep before supper."



Margo Mosher-Swain:

My aunt Cynthia, known as DewDew, was my babysitter fairly often when I was young. One evening,



she was trying to convince me to go to bed. I wasn't a little bit interested.

She finally said, "You know what, one day you will LOVE going to bed!" I remember thinking how ridiculous that was to say. Around age 30, I realized how true this really was.

Beth McGee:

My mother, Helen Dorothy, was big on doing things well. We were expected to do our very best. She would often say, "If a job is worth doing, it is worth doing well."

Sometimes, Mom would tell us she had caught a cold. We kids would ask her, "Where do you think you caught the cold?" She would often reply she thought she caught it while she took the trolley bus. As kids, we thought that was really funny.

In the backdrop of COVID times, I am much more aware of airborne illnesses. She was likely quite correct in her assertion about where she caught a cold as we have learned more about airborne viruses.

Fred Dolbel:

We grew up on a small farm with 3 or 4 house cats in residence. Supper for the cats was leftovers placed on the floor and cleaned up in minutes. As Mom picked up the empty plates and looked into the cats' longing eyes, she would exclaim, "Go out and catch mice."

Patrick Ryall: Back in the early 50s, I was a boy living in a small town in Scotland. In those days, it was normal for all married women to work at home. By work, I mean mostly manual labour, because in those days we did not have the appliances which most families have today. We had no refrigerator or washing machine. Many days a week my mother would walk downtown to buy groceries and carry them back. All the food preparation was done by hand at home. There was a little building out back of our row of houses where the women went to manually do the clothes washing.

One day my mother and her friends were having a get-together in our house, and they started talking about one of their friends who was going out to do paid work. They all felt sorry for her that she had to do this because it meant that her husband was not capable of supporting the family.

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Sharon Jessup Joyce:

My grandmother liked animals, but she had grown up in the country, and wasn't sentimental about them. She was discreetly amused by the way her son pampered his dog and her daughter doted on her cat.

At a big family gathering, Nanny was, as usual, busy taking care of everyone else. The talk turned to reincarnation.

Someone asked, "If you could choose, who would you come back as?"

Most choices were aspirational: the person who discovers the cure for cancer, an NHL star, an heiress.

When it was Nanny's turn, she said, "Well, if I wanted the best life, I'd come back as Clayton's dog or Fern's cat."

Member's Story: A life lived to the full

In honour of Mother's Day, Keith Ayling submitted this tribute written in 1999 by his daughter Elizabeth Ayling Hume to her late grandmother, Vera Ayling.

Not many people saw life the way my grandmother did. Each moment was fascinating, precious, and memorable.

When my grandmother spoke about something, it was with life and expression; and when she wrote a story, it was with passion and gusto.

Saint John was her city of birth. Her loyalty to her hometown was shown through her fierce dedication to journalism at the Telegraph-Journal.

She wrote for the Telegraph most of her life, and there was no way in this world anyone could persuade her to change employer – no other newspaper could compare.

I can see her smile as she recounted interviews of people she had met.

I can hear her voice calling me for summer suppers at her beloved Edgewater.

If I close my eyes, I can feel her arms around me again.

The scent of her favourite lily-of-thevalley perfume still lingers in the air. She treated me as a daughter she never had, and she was more a mother to me than a grandmother.

Tantallon Village Farmers Market:


Tantallon Village Farmers Market is opening again on June 14 for its 10th year.
